Through KYP, Kiwanis serves over 300,000 youth each year,

Globally, 1 in 4 youth will suffer some type of abuse or maltreatment - World Health Organization

- 85% of child abuse victims never report their abuse
- Abuse is usually at the hands of known acquaintances and family members NOT strangers
  - More than 90% of abusers are people children know, love and trust



### Why Youth Protection Matters

- Globally US\$7 trillion is lost due to violence against children each year, equivalent to 8% of global GDP- World Health Organization
- Child abuse and maltreatment are now considered a critical public health crisis by the Centers for Disease Control
  - The total lifetime economic burden resulting from new cases of fatal and nonfatal child maltreatment in the United States is approximately \$124 billion.

## Why Youth Protection Matters

- Suicide is the 2<sup>nd</sup> leading cause of death in children and adolescents in the US
- Suicide is the 3<sup>rd</sup> leading cause of death in 15-29 age group globally
- Risk factors
  - exposure to violence
  - impulsivity
  - aggressive or disruptive behavior
  - access to firearms
  - bullying
  - feelings of hopelessness or helplessness
  - acute loss or rejection



### Kiwanis Youth Protection Goals

Protect, educate and engage all Kiwanis members youth and adult.

- 1. Protect youth members from predators
- 2. Empower and educate adult members with best practices when working with youth
- 3. Provide youth with positive skills development tools designed to inspire and engage our future leaders to be their best



### Kiwanis Youth Protection Policies in ACTION

#### Social Media & Communication

- Best practice: connect with an SLP club member through a club page/account and not individual youth member accounts
- Never initiate following, friending, or liking posts and pages of individual students.
- Treat all social posts and interactions as public facing.
- Never post pictures of youth on your personal social media pages.
- Follow the "Rule of 3", always include parents/guardians or another adult (Kiwanis or Faculty Advisor, District Administrator or District Youth Protection Manager): Avoid 1:1 text messages; Avoid 1:1 emails.



### Kiwanis Youth Protection Policies in ACTION

#### Online Meetings Virtual Code of Conduct

- Unique virtual meeting links/passwords should be used for meetings or conferences with students. Passwords and links should not be shared widely.
- Host/co-host should lock the meeting or use the "waiting room" feature to only add allowed participants once meeting begins.
- Appropriate attire Appropriate tops and bottoms should be always worn.
- Appropriate language We want this to be a celebration and welcoming event. Language should not be bullying in nature, vulgar, or name-calling.
- Appropriate conduct Any conduct of an inappropriate, threatening, or offensive nature should be called out and stopped.
- Appropriate background and noise Keep background images, distractions, noise to a minimum. Hosts can mute participant.



### Kiwanis Youth Protection Policies in ACTION

#### Transportation

- At least three people in a car
- Students should ride in the back seat/rows
- Approval required from parent/guardian (written approval is best)
- Follow local school/local law policy

#### Medication

• Possession of prescription and non-prescription medications should only be allowed with written permission from parent or guardian
